THURSDAY

FRIDAY

Steve Cape: And why would that be?

He had to speak to his lawyer to avoid any libel or slander, but nevertheless, he was still going to write nasty things about people – maybe even expose certain things that would rather be kept under the covers.

Steve Cape: So, you think one of these people – who are allegedly ruining our society – killed him or had him killed?

Detective Gupta: That's all we can think of as of now. He must have written about someone who didn't want to be written about. He must have been ready to expose something that could ruin someone's life.

Steve Cape: It seems so, but who could it be? Let's be real, there's no shortage of shady people in this town. So, it could be anybody.

Detective Gupta: Indeed. Our first instinct is to check up on the politicians. With the elections coming up soon, it's possible Buck had written something that could ruin a politician's career forever. As he mentioned on your show, he had a particular distaste for political commenters, so maybe it was one of the many political commenters in our town who had him killed – if they didn't do it themselves.

Steve Cape: Well, I wish you and your team all the best Detective. I'll be keeping up with the news even when I'm gone, and I'm sure you'll catch the guy soon.

Detective Gupta: We hope so Steve, but as of now, we aren't too optimistic. While the whole town wants to know who killed Buck McGee, and I want to give them an update, I also can't lie to them and give them false hopes.

Steve Cape: Don't worry Detective, I'm sure something will happen soon.

Detective Gupta: Well, we have a saying in Hindi 'तेरे मुँह में घी शकर' – which essentially means 'may what you have said, come true.'

Steve Cape: Well, I'll drink to that!

[Short pause]

Detective Gupta: So, when are you heading out?

Steve Cape: First thing tomorrow morning. We want to beat the traffic. My lady and I are early risers so shouldn't be too long a drive.

Detective Gupta: I think I can speak on behalf of this whole town Steve, that we'll all miss you. I remember when I moved here eight years ago, I would listen to you each morning as I commuted to the station.

Steve Cape: Eight years ago? My god that seems like a lifetime. The show was still in its early days but we were rapidly becoming popular. And when did you become a detective?

Detective Gupta: Well, I began my agency two years back – I actually created a commercial and sent it to you guys, not sure if you’ve heard it yet. Anyways, I wanted to go independent but still work alongside the police. We’ve had a few small cases here and there but nothing we couldn’t handle. [Pause]

Steve Cape: Um...I’m not sure I understand.

Detective Gupta: Steve, I know that your lady owns the car dealership with her brother – and that you too have a stake in it.

Steve Cape: Detective, I think you're mistaken...maybe we should take a break...

Detective Gupta: We've been following you for almost a year now, Steve. We know that you and your lady have been involved with the car dealership. We also know that the dealership focuses on selling secondhand cars. What they never seem to mention in those ads you keep playing, is that the cars are stolen.

Steve Cape: There must be some mistake Detective, this isn't the time to discuss this—

Detective Gupta: --There's no better time than the present, Steve. We know that you've been profiting off selling stolen cars. [Pause]
